SYLLABUS

Title of the Course: IED 368 (01) British Drama II

Year and Term: 2016-2017 Spring Class Hours: Friday 09:00-11:50 Classroom: Yıldız Amfi M5

I. Aims and Objectives

The aim of the course is to introduce students to the crucial developments of British drama from the eighteenth century to the 1940s with special emphasis on the analysis of nine representative plays.

III. Textbook

There is no set textbook for this course. Students themselves are responsible for obtaining the texts stated in the weekly schedule.

IV. Method of Instruction

The course will be conducted through lectures where theoretical and background information is concerned. Yet, the majority of the class hours will be devoted to in-class discussions and presentations that have been previously assigned to the students.

V. Requirements

The students are expected to attend the classes having read the texts since in-class discussion is essential. The students are to make ample use of the libraries (Hacettepe, Bilkent and METU), and read secondary sources on the course topics. The students are expected to make three- to five-minute presentations either individually or in groups. More than 11 hours of absence will result in F1.

VI. Assessment

There will be two mid-term examinations, a presentation, and a final examination. In the grading of the exams up to 25% of the total mark will be taken off for grammatical and writing mistakes. Also students who get less than 50/100 in the final exam will automatically fail the course no matter how high their mid-term results are.
